Each Council member will not be participating, influencing, or voting on any such warrant bearing their name or which benefits the same named Council member, but with that exception is voting in favor of receiving and filing all other warrants contained in this report, unless otherwise noted on the record at the time of the approval of the action required by this report.

4. <u>AUGUST 2016 TREASURER'S REPORT</u>

The Treasurer's Report for Cash and Investments for the month of August 2016 is attached.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the City Council receive, approve, and file the August 2016 Treasurer's Report.

5. <u>CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE - BIENNIAL NOTICE REQUIRED BY THE POLITICAL REFORM ACT</u>

As required by the Political Reform Act: G.C. § 87306 (a) Every agency shall amend its Conflict of Interest Code, subject to the provisions of Section 87303, when change is necessitated by changed circumstances, including the creation of new positions which must be designated pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 87302 and relevant changes in the duties assigned to existing positions. Amendments or revisions shall be submitted to the code reviewing body within 90 days after the changed circumstances necessitating the amendments have become apparent.

Recommendation: It is staff's recommendation that the City Council approve and file the attached 2016 Local Agency Biennial Notice.

6. <u>CALPERS COMPLIANCE - AMENDMENTS TO CITY PAY SCHEDULES AND PWEA AND PWSA AGREEMENTS</u>

The California Public Employees' Retirement System Office of Audit Services (CalPERS) conducted an audit of the City and is requiring the City to identify the pay schedule from fiscal year 2012/13 to fiscal year 2015/16 to include the time base and have the pay schedules reapproved by the City Council. CalPERS is also requiring the City to calculate and report the monetary value of the uniforms provided to public works employees as well as memorialize via a side letter to the PWEA and PWSA 2012-2014 MOU and the 2014-2016 MOU. City staff has reported to CalPERS the dollar value of the uniforms at approximately \$154.90 per employee, and is now requesting the City Council to approve the side letter agreements to memorialize the dollar value of the uniforms provided to the public work employees. Taking the recommended action does not provide any new pay or benefits but rather only clarifies existing pay and benefits in accordance with PERS findings.

Recommendation: It is Staff recommendation that the City Council approve Resolution Nos. 2016-44, 2016-45, 2016-46 and 2016-47 thereby adopting the revised fiscal year Employee Classifications and Compensation resolutions for FY 12/13, FY 13/14, FY 14/15 and FY 15/16. Staff is also recommending that the City Council approve Resolution No. 2016-48, adopting side letter agreements with the Public Works Employees Association (PWEA) and Public Works Supervisors Association (PWSA) for the 2012-2014 Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") and the 2014-2016 MOU.

7. <u>FUEL TANK CLEANING SERVICE – EMERGENCY GENERATOR</u>

Diesel generator maintenance is essential for critical facilities such as the Police Department. Mission-critical standby systems, such as generators, provide power to vital operations power systems for public safety, national security, and business continuity. Regular scheduled maintenance has not been performed to the 28-year old diesel tank that powers the emergency generator. Under BGMC 3.04.100, the City can dispense with formal bidding process "when an emergency, as determined by purchasing officer, requires that the purchase or sale be completed within a period of time which will not permit normal bidding or quotation procedures". Staff is requesting that the city's underground diesel fuel tank which operates the emergency generator located at the Police Department be serviced and tested to provide power to vital city operations. There are adequate funds in the Public Works Facility Maintenance Budget for 2016-2017.

Recommendation: It is staff's recommendation that the City Council by motion: Adopt City Council Resolution No. 2016-49 authorize a purchase order in the amount of \$24,678.80 with Quinn Power Systems for fuel tank cleaning services of the emergency generator located at the Police Department and waive the formal bidding process. In accordance with BGMC 3.04.100, the City can dispense with the formal bidding process when an emergency exists.
